Paul Morris, a member of FCSD3's board of trustees, and Everett Hannah visited the Alternative Center for Education (ACE) Friday, April 13, with a special morning message.

The Alternative Center for Education (ACE) is a program for students who are at-risk, will benefit from alternative educational options or are placed here by parental requests (which have dramatically increased during the 2017-2018 school year). Currently the program has approximately 50 students attending the regular day program and after school program.

Ms. Morris spoke to the students about the importance of having good character and avoiding negative influences. She encouraged students to use their placement at ACE as a learning experience and a stepping stone – not a stopping point.

Mr. Hannah followed with more great words: Be the "real" you at home, at school, and in the streets. The first step to finding and accepting the "real" you is to decide what your goal is in life, understand what it takes to reach the goal and then go for I, he said. Mr. Hannah stressed that it is passion that will drive you to the "real" you.

The students were allowed to ask questions and share their feelings. This was a time for them to "be real". They were very appreciative of Ms. Morris and Mr. Hannah's inspirational speeches.
