of learning and adventure, seventh- and eighth-grade students discovered the scientific world with all of their senses to better understand how they are tied to the world around them.

Students learned about their carbon footprints and their impact in "The Human Impact" course. They also learned how to preserve, conserve and protect our environment.

By chasing butterflies and capturing insects like a true Entomologist, students learned all about insects and arthropods.

In the "Pondering Life" class, they investigated ecosystems, succession, and trophic levels. They focused on reptiles and amphibians native to SC and their adaptations, behaviors, and life cycles in the "Herpetology" class.

The overwhelming favorite class, "Let's Sea," allowed students to take a two-mile walk along the beach to observe and discuss tides, beach zones, barrier island information,

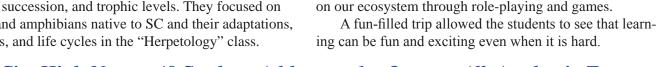

The State Health Plan's Tobacco-Use Premium Now Includes E-Cigarettes

An electronic cigarette, or e-cigarette, is a hand-held, battery-operated device that emits both vaporized nicotine and non-nicotine solutions for inhalation. E-cigarette usage has become more prevalent the past few years, and has most recently become a significant health concern because of conditions believed to be associated with such use.

Accordingly, PEBA has updated the <u>Certification</u> Regarding Tobacco and E-cigarette Use form to include e-cigarettes. You can find the new form online and should begin using this new form immediately. Please inform your subscribers of this update to the policy and let them know that the tobacco use premium now applies to subscribers and covered dependents who use e-cigarettes. You do not need to submit new certification forms for every subscriber; however, subscribers who use e-cigarettes, or cover dependents who use e-cigarettes, need to complete a new form. Similar to those who use tobacco, subscribers and their covered dependents who use e-cigarettes can complete the Quit for Life® smoking cessation program.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

has issued an investigative report on the use of e-cigarettes with data collected from 25 states. Its findings show that respiratory issues can happen over a short period before hospitalization may be required. You can read the <u>detailed</u> report here.

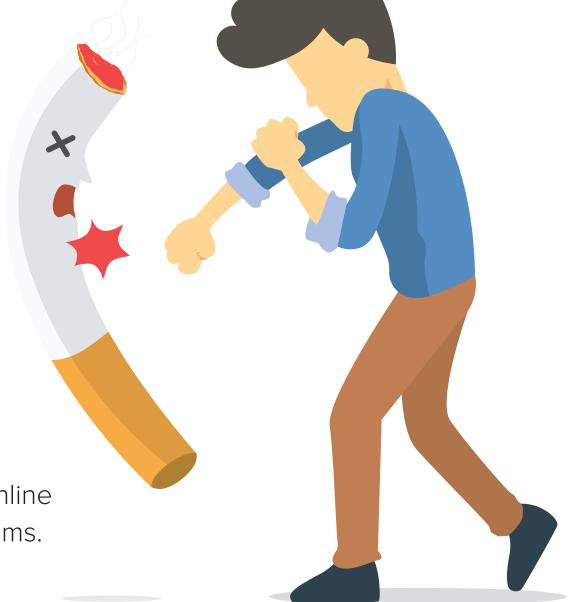
If you smoke, the time to quit is now.

- Coaching by phone at your convenience.
- Recommendations on nicotine replacement therapy such as patches, gum or lozenges.
- Free supply of nicotine replacement therapy, if you choose to use it.
- A Quit Kit with helpful materials, plus interactive online features, such as social forums.

Manage Your Retirement Account with Member Access



You can access your retirement account 24/7 with Member Access at online.retirement.sc.gov.

- Review your service credit. Along with age, service credit determines whether you are eligible for retirement.
- Create benefit estimates. The estimates use your retirement account information, a potential average final compensation and a selected retirement date.
- Manage service credit purchases. You can calculate an unofficial cost estimate to buy service credit. You can also submit a service purchase request.
- Submit a service retirement application.
 Apply for retirement up to six months before your retirement date. You can also view the status of your application.
- Change your State Optional Retirement
 Program (State ORP) service provider, if
 applicable. Changes can be made during
 annual open enrollment, which occurs January 1
 to March 1.
- Update your contact information. This
 helps PEBA keep in touch with you now and in
 retirement. You can expect occasional emails
 about important issues or operational changes.

- · Review your beneficiary information.
 - Primary beneficiaries receive any retirement benefits payable upon your death.
 - Contingent beneficiaries may receive benefits if you die while still in service and all of your primary beneficiaries die before you.
 - Incidental death benefit beneficiaries receive the incidental death benefit payable upon your death, if you were eligible.
- Review your account balance. The balance
 does not affect the calculation of your monthly
 retirement benefit, but may be payable as
 a death benefit to your beneficiaries. The
 balance also reflects the amount payable if you
 terminate employment and take a refund of
 your contributions.
- **Request a refund.** Taxes are applicable to your account balance if you request a refund.

Inactive members can review their account balance and update their contact information. You are an inactive member if you are not working and contributing to your account and have not retired.
