# Board of Trustees Names New Principals at Scranton, Olanta for 2018-2019

The Florence County School District Three board of trustees approved Superintendent Laura Hickson's recommendation to appoint two new school principals for the 2018-2019 school year at the board's monthly meeting Thursday.

Shanda Poston was appointed principal at Scranton Elementary STEAM Academy and Tonyelle Thomas was

named principal of Olanta Creative Arts and Science Magnet School.

"I feel honored and blessed to have this opportunity and promise to do my best to continue the expectation of excellence at Scranton Elementary STEAM Academy," Poston said.

Poston has served as assistant principal at Scranton Elementary since 2014 and played an instrumental role in the school's earning STEM

accreditation from AdvancED and Scranton Elementary's selection as a Palmetto's Finest finalist for the past two years. She also spent 10 years as a classroom teacher, including five years at J. Paul Truluck Middle School.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in education from Coastal Carolina University and a Master of Science in Educational Administration from the University of Scranton (PA).

Thomas served as assistant principal at Main Street Elementary School for the past year and was an administrative assistant and math instructional coach prior to that. She also has served as a math interventionist and STEM mentor teacher. In addition, she was an elementary classroom teacher for more than six years.

She graduated magna cum laude from Francis Marion University with

a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. She earned a Master of Science degree in Educational Administration

from the University of South Carolina.

"I am deeply honored to become the new principal of Olanta Elementary Creative Arts and Science Magnet School," Thomas said. "I am excited to begin working with the staff, students and the community on the Magnet School Initiative. A lot of great things are in the works and I'm thrilled to be in Bearcat Country."

# Input Sought for Grant Applications

Florence County School District Three is seeking public input on the use of federal funds before submitting federal grant applications for the 2018-2019 school year under the Every Student Succeeds Act, the latest reauthorization of the 1965 Elementary and Secondary Education Act approved by the U. S. Congress in December 2015 and which replaces the No Child Left Behind Act. Through this law, substantial federal support is provided for programs to serve students in kindergarten through 12th grades. The district anticipates receiving funds for Title I, II and III. The grants are for Title I, Part A – Helping Disadvantaged Children Meeting High Standards; Title II, Part A – Preparing, Training and Recruiting High Quality Teachers and Principals; Title III – Limited English Proficiency. The deadlines for these grants range from June 1 through July 1.

Because these grants deal with federal funds, the district is asking for comments and suggestions from parents and community stakeholders.

There will be a public informational meeting about Title I, II and III Thursday, March 29, 2018. In an effort to accommodate Florence County School District Three's residents, two sessions will be offered. The first session will be held at Florence County School District Three in the Staff Development Room located at 125 South Blanding Street in Lake City from 4-5 p.m. A second session will be held from 6-8 p.m. in the Banquet Hall at NanYa Plastics Corp located at 140 Beulah Road in Lake City.

# SOLVED! The Case of the Stolen Coin

When Scranton Elementary STEAM Academy's Gifted and Talented students came to class recently, they were surprised to see that a crime occurred.

The area, roped off in "Crime Scene" tape, was exclusive to the Crime Lab Scientists (which they had become). With some background information, the CLS learned that a coin was stolen from the collection of a friend.

The CLS used iPads to record evidence from the scene. Various tests were performed on the evidence and the results were analyzed. These tests included fingerprint and footprint analysis, pH analysis of liquids, handwriting analysis, tool impressions, chromatography and mystery powder analysis.

After the tests were conducted, students wrote a summary of what had happened and, based on the results of the analyses, named the culprit who stole the coin.

The students enjoyed playing the role of Crime Lab Scientists and examining the evidence using hands-on science. The crime scene activity wrapped up a unit on mysteries including a mystery novel, and an enigma presentation.
